LAWS

IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, and Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Student success is key!

LAWS

Title II of the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) and amendments, Fair Housing Act, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.

Equal access is key!

RESPONSIBILITY

The school and school district is responsible for addressing disability related needs and accommodations.

RESPONSIBILITY

The student is responsible for self-disclosing disability related needs and requesting accommodations. The Office of Accessibility Resources takes action when the student directly addresses their needs.

PARENTS

The parent(s) can engage with school staff about the student without the student's consent or presence.

PARENTS

The parent(s) should advise and encourage the student to self-advocate, but **only** the student can share accommodation concerns with college staff and faculty, and needs to give legal permission to share info.

TEACHERS

- Modify expectations, rigor, or content of curriculum.
- Allow assignments to be submitted late or tests to be retaken with little to no penalty.
- Provide missed information due to absence.

FACULTY

- Ensure that accommodations are implemented. Instructors are not required to:
- Lower or change essential course requirements.
 - Allow retesting or late assignment submissions.
 - Provide missed information due to absence.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

Participate in free, appropriate public education.

COLLEGE STUDENTS

- Engage in the interactive process. Notify professors of approved accommodations (as needed).
- Understand how accommodations apply based on course expectations.

MAIPSE-affiliated Schools

About MAIPSE

MAIPSE provides opportunities for people with severe disabilities who are 18 and over to attend public colleges and universities in Massachusetts. All public colleges and universities in Massachusetts must have the resources available to support students with intellectual disabilities on their campuses.

MAIPSE used to be called MAICEI (Massachusetts Inclusive Concurrent Enrollment Initiative). With MAIPSE, people with intellectual disabilities, autism, and other developmental disabilities who have exited school without a diploma or meet the criteria to include college in their transition services, can participate in college as non-matriculated students.

Students participating in MAIPSE are fully included in the campus community as they develop their capacities in career planning and employment, self-advocacy, and other self-determined abilities that support their postsecondary interests and activities.

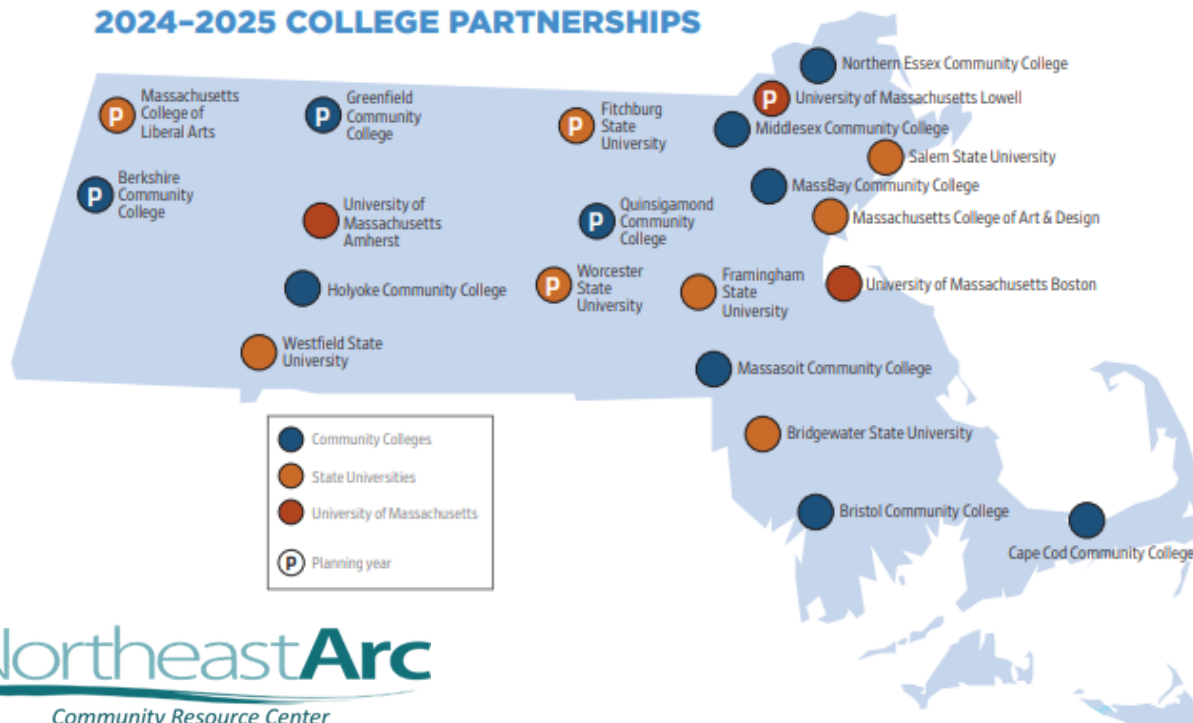

PAL provides support to college-ready students who have language-based learning disabilities, executive function challenges, or ADD/ADHD with average to superior intellectual ability. Students in the PAL program are fully integrated into their Curry classes and receive additional support on a proactive basis. Students work in individual and/or small classes with a PAL faculty member developing strategies in areas such as reading comprehension, written language, speaking, listening, organization, and time management.

Curry College's Social Achievement in Learning (SAIL) Program - Milton, MA

The Social Achievement in Learning (SAIL) program is designed for academically capable full-time, undergraduate Curry students with neurodiverse profiles. Students are provided with social coaching, transitional assistance, self-advocacy support, and sensory-friendly housing. The SAIL team includes a Speech Language Pathologist and a Wellness Coordinator, along with Community Directors with specialized training in ASD. Students also benefit from assistance in skills such as understanding social cues and nonverbal communication, socialization with peers, and the process of completing academic work.

Previous training is not required, but a strong interest in art and the ability to work within a shared studio environment with other artists is necessary.

Students meet weekly with a Program Advisor to discuss time management and self-advocacy, academic advisement and monitoring of progress, and early course registration for first-year and sophomore students.
